JP Morgan Chase has provided the TSTT program a grant in 2012 totaling \$170,000 in part to help ensure the career development program can provide four years of support to 10 students currently in 9th grade at the Leadership Academy of Young Men in addition to students already in the program at the Eagle Academy for Young Men in the Bronx and 50 students attending high schools in Bridgeport, CT Public Schools. TSTT mentors, trains and prepares these students for college, hopefully at one of their 23 partnering colleges, which agree to offer tuition scholarships of 50%.
